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Final Thesis:

Big Picture

1 Kings traces the rise, splendor, division, and decline of Israel's monarchy—from King David's final days through Solomon's reign, the kingdom's split into **Israel (north)** and **Judah (south)**, and the prophetic confrontation led especially by Elijah.

It's not just political history—it's theological history:

Covenant faithfulness to God determines national flourishing or collapse.

1 Kings 1–2: Succession Crisis
